Walk On In -- This May Be Your Lucky Day

Something new started in October at the Modesto Library – the Lucky Day collection. It is made up of highly anticipated and in-demand titles. If you find a book on the Lucky Day shelf, you can immediately check it out. No hold requests needed. The basics, says library director Chris Moreno:

- Lucky Day books can be checked out for the normal 21-day period
- Holds are not allowed on Lucky Day books
- Lost, damaged, and late fees for Lucky Day items are treated like regular circulating items
- There is a limit of one Lucky Day item out at a time.



Several public libraries have started similar collections in response to long wait times for popular books. This idea is piloting in Modesto and could roll out to other branches, Chris said. Modesto also may expand the Lucky choices.
